Dr. Mayda Gonzalez-Bosch, a 2024 EdD alumna of the Manhattanville Dissertation Completion Pathway grew up in Cuba where most of her family still lives. She identifies as Hispanic and a first-generation college student. Earlier this year, Mayda, previously Associate Dean of Health Professions at Bergen Community College, was hired as the new associate vice president for health professions, to oversee the degree programs within SUNY Orange's Health Sciences and Wellness academic community. Mayda, who also holds a M.D., brings experience and leadership to healthcare education.

Mayda's dissertation was a qualitative study of faculty preparedness to teach community college students with learning disabilities. Her research underscores her unwavering dedication to under-served and marginalized students, including students with learning disabilities, and her commitment to work with faculty to ameliorate issues that might emerge in the classroom that could contribute to students' fears of stigmatization.





In August 2024, Mayda was honored as one of the Top 50 Women Leaders in Education. Ranked 7th on the prestigious list compiled by Women We Admire, a leading organization for women executives across North America, Gonzalez-Bosch was recognized for her transformative leadership in education. Anibal Soler, Jr. is a current doctoral student in the Dissertation Completion Pathway of the Manhattanville Doctoral Program in Educational Leadership, anticipating defense of his dissertation proposal for a study of credit recovery options.





On May 1, 2024, Anibal started his role as Superintendent of Yonkers Public Schools, having previously served as Superintendent of the Schenectady City School District. In Yonkers, Anibal is leading New York's 3<sup>rd</sup> largest school systems with almost 23,000 students in grades K-12. Yonkers had the honor in September to welcome Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor to the ribbon cutting of the Justice Sonia Sotomayor Community School. Read more HERE.

Anibal, who identifies as Latino, know firsthand the transformative power of representation and mentorship for young men of color, as he asserted in this <u>August 2024 opinion piece</u>. Across various districts in New York State, Anibal has started or supported a chapter of My Brothers' Keeper, a program launched by President Barack Obama in response to the death of Trayvon Martin, which works to improve the lives of boys and young men of color. In this piece, Anibal described a "changing narrative for New York, where people of color are at the forefront of educational leadership."








Dr. Sagrario Rudecindo-O'Neill, a 2022 EdD alumna of the Signature (PK-12) Leadership pathway, is a proud daughter of an immigrant mother from the Dominican Republic. Soon after earning her EdD, she was selected to serve as a member of the NYSED Blue Ribbon Commission. In 2021, Sagrario was also the inaugural recipient of the Judith Johnson Memorial Award, in recognition of her commitment to support racially minoritized populations and taking action to redress racial injustices.



Sagrario, whose research was a critical qualitative study of white elementary school principals' leadership of race initiatives in an era of CRT backlash, has contributed her expertise generously at Manhattaville Doctoral Program events. Dr. Raymond "Ray" Sanchez, a Champion of Educational Equity, is a 2019 alumnus of the Manhattanville EdD Dissertation Completion Pathway. Ray, who serves as the Superintendent of the Public Schools of the Tarrytowns, was recognized as 2025 Superintendent of the Year by the New York State Council of School Superintendents. Council President, Lars Clemensen, said, "Throughout his career, Ray has been a leader in the superintendency, from driving advocacy initiatives that increased resources in high-need communities across New York State and as an educational leader, creating trajectory-changing opportunities for his students."



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Dr. Sanchez's commitment to equity is deeply rooted in his Hispanic background. With Dr. Joanne Marien, doctoral faculty in Educational Leadership, Ray Sanchez, conceptualized the innovative Changemakers Program -- a transformative experiential learning endeavor aimed at empowering Latina high school students. First launched in 2023, with Ossining School District, this initiative, in partnership with Open Roads, was expanded in 2024 to serve Ossining, Tarrytown, and Peekskill School Districts. Dr. Madeline Sanchez-Diamond, also a Manhattanville EdD alumna, joined the collaborative effort.

As Manhattanville's first Latino president, Dr. Frank Sánchez was honored with the Trailblazer Award from the Weschester Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. Michael Dunn, Chair of the Board, Manhattanville University, stated that Sánchez's "recognition with the Trailblazer Award is a testament to his unwavering commitment to our community and his visionary leadership." Frank D. Sánchez, PhD, began his term as 15th president of Manhattanville in July 2023.

In 2021, Manhattanville joined a distinguished group that are designated as Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSI) by the U.S. Department of Education. To qualify as an HSI, Hispanic students must comprise at least 25% of the full-time equivalent student body. Currently 40% of Manhattanville's student body identifies as Hispanic. With this designation, Manhattanville will continue its long tradition of providing pathways to students' success, supporting Latinx students in its commitment to expand opportunities for all members of the diverse campus community.
