Game Day Setup

Net Assembly:

- ✓ Set up the net to the proper height: 36 inches at the sidelines and 34 inches in the center. Ensure it's taut and evenly suspended.

Equipment Check:

- ✓ Confirm there are enough paddles and balls for everyone. Set aside a few extras in a visible spot for quick replacements.

Safety Inspection:

- ✓ Double-check the court area for hazards like loose stones, holes, or slippery spots. If playing outdoors, consider the sun's position and potential glare.

Warm-Up Area:

- ✓ Designate a nearby area for stretching and light practice before the game starts. This helps prevent injuries and gets players ready for action.



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Game Formats

Doubles Play

Pairing Up:

- ✓ Try to pair players in a way that balances the teams. You could pair a more experienced player with a beginner, or use a random draw.

Match Format:

- ✓ Standard pickleball rules apply. Consider playing best of three games to 11 points for a little competitive edge.

Rotation:

- ✓ Encourage teams to play against different pairs for variety.

Benefits:

- ✓ Doubles is a fun way to encourage teamwork and strategy, and it allows more players on the court at once.

Skills Challenge

Setup:

- ✓ Create stations focusing on different skills – serving accuracy, volley exchanges, dinks, etc.

Challenge Examples:

- ✓
 1. Serving accuracy: Players aim to serve into specific sections of the court.
 2. Volley duels: Pairs rally at the net to practice quick volleys.
 3. Dinking game: Players only use soft shots (dinks) to rally over the net.

Rotation:

- ✓ Players can rotate through stations, spending a set amount of time at each.

Benefits:

- ✓ This format is especially good for beginners to practice specific skills, but it can also be fun and challenging for more experienced players.
